This historic day honours the contributions of Professor Mahadeva Lal Schroff, the pioneer of pharmacy education in India. The theme for this year was "Entrepreneurship & Startups in Pharma and Pharmacy Practice - Encouraging Innovation, Incubation Centres, and Pharmaceutical Startups." The objective of the program was to provide insights into innovation-driven pharmaceutical careers, the importance of incubation centres, and the role of entrepreneurship in advancing the pharmaceutical industry.

One-Day Online Workshop on Intellectual Property Rights in India @GCU

GUWAHATI, Mar 18: On March 13th, 2025, Centre for Legal Studies at Girijananda Chowdhury University, Guwahati, Assam, in collaboration with the IPR Cell, GCU, organized a one-day workshop on "Legal Aspects on Intellectual Property Rights in India", to provide a comprehensive understanding of IPRs and their legal framework through ZOOM Platform from 2:00 PM onwards. The resource person, Dr. Parveen Islam, Assistant Professor Law, NEF Law College, was invited to share her insights on the topic. The Head of the Department, Centre for Legal Studies, GCU, Dr. Niju Moni Das, welcomed everyone and led the opening remarks. Dr. Parveen led the discussion on the importance of intellectual property rights in the current global landscape, the role of legal protections for innovation, and the awareness needed for economic development. The meeting focused on the legal aspects of intellectual property rights in India, covering patents, copyrights, trademarks, geographical indications, and plant varieties. She explained that patents protect inventions, which are new products or processes with industrial applications. She outlined the criteria for patentability, including novelty, non-obviousness, and industrial applicability. She stated that copyright protects various creative works, including literary, artistic, dramatic, musical, and computer-generated works, giving creators exclusive rights for their lifetime plus 60 years, or 60 years for posthumous publications. She, further, outlined the benefits of copyright registration, including worldwide protection and legal remedies for infringement, while noting exceptions for government works, legislative acts, and court judgments and the concept of trademarks, their importance, and key aspects of the Trade Marks Act 1999. She defined trademarks as symbols or logos that represent specific products or services, making them easily identifiable to consumers. Furthermore, she explained GI and their importance in protecting products unique to specific regions. She provided examples, such as Darjeeling tea and Muga silk of Assam, emphasizing how geographical factors contribute to their distinct qualities. The discussion then shifted to plant varieties and farmers' rights, highlighting the importance of protecting and recognizing farmers and breeders who develop new plant varieties for increased yield and food security. The discussion emphasized the need for awareness about intellectual property laws and their enforcement mechanisms, while also addressing challenges posed by emerging technologies like AI-generated innovations.

Ms. Madhusmita Ronghangpi, Assistant Professor, Centre for Legal Studies, GCU, delivered the vote of thanks. 100 participants joined the workshop. E-certificates were provided to all the participants.
